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Minister's Letter

This month marks quite the milestone for me personally. It will be 10 years since I received and accepted my first call in ministry and this month and next I will be using this space to reflect on the changes, the challenges and high points of this chapter in my life. It will probably be my most introspective letter so far so please allow my indulgence but milestones like this do tend to put you in a reflective mood. In so many ways, a lot has changed and in many ways a number of things have stayed the same. But first, let's start at the very beginning (it's a very good place to start).

For me, going into ministry was always something I felt I was called to do. I remember my first time leading a service. It was at Ballinderry Church in Northern Ireland, and it was a youth service, so they decided to ask a young person to put it together and lead it. I felt at home delivering a service that included a magic trick. Yes, my very first service included a magic trick. Mark that up as one thing that hasn't changed. This beginning is one of the reasons I see the importance of encouraging and enabling people in the church to do things, especially children and young people. Ministers have never had a place of overall power in the Moravian tradition, and we operate a priesthood of all believers which means an acceptance that we all have gifts from God and we all have a calling to serve God in whatever way we are equipped to do so.

For me, ministry was something I planned to do later in life and so it was something I kept pushing

to back of my mind. That was until I heard my call to serve God during the ordination service of Br Michael Newman.

Sr Beth Torkington was talking about the challenges the church was going to face and I felt God pushing and calling saying, "why are you waiting to do later what I need you to do now". Following that service, I put in my letter of application and then 5 years afterwards (I had just missed the deadline to start college that year so had to wait a year before starting my training) took my first call. I saw a quote on Facebook this week that said, "Someone, somewhere, is depending on you to do what God has called you to do". The challenge within that though is recognising what God has called you to do and then, from my own experience, enabling others to see that within you.

One of the proudest moments in my ministry came last year during our provincial Synod. It was a powerful double whammy of agreeing the statement of inclusion, followed by the passing of the proposal to allow the blessing of same sex marriages in our churches. The most important part of our Moravian ethos is the acceptance of each other's differences and the knowledge that we are all one in Christ. But that brings me to the biggest challenge I've had to face.

I am not what most people think of when they think of a minister. I have throughout my life, in whatever setting I've found myself to be in, struggled to fit in. I often describe myself as a square peg. And yet, despite the church's understanding and apparent acceptance of our differences, I still feel the pressure of fitting in to a model of minister that doesn't match with who I am, the skills I have, the weaknesses I carry or even my innate theology. It has been, and continues to be, something of a battle. People often see me as a very confident person and that is because I'm, at heart, a performer. I always aim to please the crowd and put on a mask of confidence that all performers rely upon. The truth, the real me, is someone who struggles with his mental health, who lacks self confidence and struggles almost daily with the desire for true acceptance.

I remember speaking to Sr Betsy Miller who is a minister in the USA and was present at the Synod last year. She spoke to me privately and the content of what she said will remain largely private. But she had noticed the difficulties I have fitting in and how awkward I can be. She said, "embrace the fact that you are a square peg." And I'm trying but really, the church should be able to have the flexibility to have many holes that fit all types of pegs.

As I have already written, I believe we all have skills and gifts given from God and as much as I can see that in others, seeing it in myself has always been that bit harder. But, over the last 10 years I've gained an awareness of what I am good at as well as what I am not good at. There are skills I know I have and can bring to the church and there are things where I need more help and people to support me and to

support the church as well. If we truly mean the words that are in our statement of inclusion, then that must surely apply to our minsters as well.

Next month I will be focusing more on looking forward, but I will say here that the church needs to adapt and change in order to face the future and to be standing and indeed thriving for years to come.

Therefore, I'm going to finish by asking you a question. I'm not going to answer it for you and nor is there a right or wrong answer, but it is something for you to think about over this month. Is our church a more inclusive place following the acceptance of our statement of inclusion?

Remember the words of the apostle James, "For just as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is also dead." James 2:26

VIA EXULANTIS - the refugee road

In preparation for the Fulneck Heritage Open Day (Saturday 16 September) I have been researching the history of the Moravian Church. I started by looking back to how early members of Unitas Fratrum,

Christian David and others, left Moravia to escape persecution and moved to Herrnhut. I discovered that today there is a pilgrim way that follows the route, called the Via Exulantis.

On their Facebook Group I have read a few comments that I thought I would share with you. Please accept that the Group is Czech and so I rely on Google to translate for me. Hence in some places I have had to make changes, hopefully correctly.

The Group starts with a statement about how the Via Exulantis began when five young men decided to escape the persecution they faced for their faith. It goes on to describe how these young men prayed for help along the way.


I put up a short comment and one reply is from Ales Sinuhet Pawlus: I felt this was worth sharing.

'The story with the Moravian Brothers is very powerful ... it is missing in Czech history textbooks. But in the world the Moravian brothers know. Especially in America but even in Greenland, Canada and England. And of course Germany where they were given asylum. The town of Herrnhut still exists today: home of the famous Herrnhut star, created by Moravians. Even in Berlin, there are still neighbourhoods where the Moravian spirit lives. Moravians from Suchdol and Fulnek (both in the Czech Republic today) made history. They didn't go to war, they didn't occupy foreign territory. They were humble as none of us could imagine. Yet they managed to address every culture across the world.'

In another entry on Facebook Google definitely got it wrong. According to the translation, people largely left Suchdol on foot but a few took their farm animals and cars. I suspect they meant 'carts' ... what do you think?

At the Heritage Day there will be maps of the Via Exulantis. If any of you are up for a long walk you can follow in the footsteps of these early refugees and get a signed certificate if you complete the pilgrimage.
