Minister's Letter

February is a month that is associated with two things, Love and Lent, and this year those two celebrations fall on the same day. The season of Lent this year begins on 14 February, which, of course, is Valentine's Day. Some of you may look at this and think nothing of it; however I often look at coincidences like this as a way of God prompting us. Rather than looking at this as simply a coincidence, perhaps we could see it as a Godincidence instead.

Lent is a time when Christians around the world decide to give up certain things until Easter Sunday. The most popular things to give up are alcohol, chocolates, sweets and social media. Giving up things for Lent is something that I've personally never found to be particularly helpful.

For some it helps to focus their minds on connecting with God through the sufferings of Jesus in Holy Week and throughout His forty days and forty nights in the wilderness post baptism. I remember one year giving up mints for Lent. They are a particular weakness of mine. If you asked my Mum, she would blame it on my grandma, who never went anywhere without a packet of Softmints in her handbag and I would often get a few from her whenever I saw her. Still to this day, they're one of my favourites, although I think mint imperials may now hold top spot, but I digress.

I found the process of giving up something I loved to be annoying and made me rather grumpy and instead of giving me a closer connection to God, it just meant that I would be thinking about mints instead. For me, I like to see the season of Lent as a chance to **add** something, rather than take something **away.** Christian Aid has, over the last few years, run a "Count your blessings" campaign that runs through the season of Lent that encourages us to take stock of the many things that we have to be grateful for and to use that to calculate an amount to donate to their work. If they do the same this year I will make sure that the resources are available to you but at time of writing on their website it simply says "coming soon".

Perhaps then this is where we can use the wonderful symmetry of Valentine's and Lent to our, and God's advantage. Looking around us at the events unfolding globally and even locally there is no doubt that the world needs more love. Whilst it's true that Valentine's Day tends to focus purely on romantic love between people, love itself is much more far reaching and cannot be limited in anyway. As St Paul memorably wrote:

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. [1 corinthians 13:4-7]

This Lent season I want to encourage you all to think about ways you can help to spread a little bit more love. Prayerfully ask the Lord of Love to show you ways to be more loving to those around you and to work to share the love of God with those in need, in whatever way you can.

There's a children's hymn that I remember from primary school assemblies called the Magic Penny and I'm going to finish with some words from it.

Love is something if you give it away, Give it away, give it away. Love is something if you give it away, You end up having more.

It's just like a magic penny,
Hold it tight and you won't have any.
Lend it, spend it, and you'll have so many
They'll roll all over the floor.

May we all use this season to fill our lives and the lives of those around us with Love.

In March 1946 they included an article titled 'A pot-purri of school memories, 1901-7.' Here is one short extract from that piece.

'Water-rats in the beck. Pheasants in Tong Wood, - and an irate gamekeeper at our heels one holiday afternoon. Going through the tunnel at Gib.. Barefoot collops below Dye House Lane squaring up and fighting each other just for the sport of the thing. A poacher and his lurcher in the Valley. Sunday afternoon with our books in the lush grass of Sisters' Wood. A hard winter and the sledging down Dye House Lane.'

What a different world, and yet recognisable in many ways. More may follow in future months. For now, can anyone explain 'barefoot collops' and the tunnel at Gib.? I look forward to hearing any explanations that you can offer.

Holy Habits: Fellowship

Here we are at the beginning of the passage. 'They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship.' What exactly is that all about? It's a word that we use all the time in church when we say the grace with the phrase 'and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit.'

Here's a challenge for you. If someone came to church who'd never been before and asked you what that means, how would you explain it?

Looking at these Holy Habits has highlighted to me that we have a language we use in church that isn't always familiar to those who don't come, which can itself make people feel like outsiders. But how much of the language do we really understand or has saying it become a habit?

Another challenge for you! Now you've had time to think about what fellowship means, when have you experienced it either at church or in other settings?

The church building I grew up with, and had links to until a few years ago when my mum died, was built when I was seven. Before then we'd worshipped in a wooden hut which was multi-functional. You always sat next to someone as there was so little space and, because we didn't have a building to drain our time, we could focus on each other.

When the church was built there was a smaller room included that was called the fellowship room. This was used for midweek sessions and Sunday evening services. These services were very special for me, and looking back now, I realise that it was during these that I first experienced true fellowship with God and the others who worshipped there. They were far more intimate and relaxed than the more formal morning ones.

A final challenge for you. What extra things could we offer at Fulneck that would encourage people to experience fellowship? I accept that we may experience fellowship at different times and in different places but do we offer enough variety at the moment?

I haven't given a definition of fellowship but it's certainly deeper than chit-chat over a cuppa and biscuit! Why not look it up in a dictionary.
